SAD NEWS

Just a few days after his 50th birthday there was shocking news for Davey Johnstone as he learned about the sudden death of nineyear old son, Oliver, while performing with Elton and Billy in Chicago on May 7. Elton, who was visibly shaken up, announced it at the show just before he did Candle in the Wind. Davey was absent for the final part of the show. Oliver Johnstone drowned in the swimming pool of the family home in California.

Hercules sent its heartfelt sympathies to Davey and his family, and we passed your messages on which were sent to us. We received the following from Davey:

To: Hercules Readers, From: Davey Johnstone Re: Condolences for Oliver Kay and I have been deeply moved by your statements of love and support for our family in this very sad, difficult time. It's incredible how such a tradgedy can change so many peoples lives, but thanks to our dear friends, we are trying to find a way to deal with our pain, so that maybe someday the pain will become a part of our everyday life. We will miss Oliver so much! Thank you again for your kindness.

HEAVY TRAFFIC

Elton auctions 20 of his prestige car collection at Christies

The sale of the biggest ever collection of a celebrity's cars was held in at auctionéers Christie's in London on June 5. 2001, when Elton auctioned 20 of his prestige collection. The 20 cars up for sale went for a total of £1.705 million, plus London auctioneer Christie's commission, which took the final figure to £1,951,725 (US\$2,749,981). Buyers for Elton's fleet of cars were worldwide, but the right-hand drive of most of the cars meant most went to UK buvers. Christie's deputy chairman Dermot Chichester told a news conference after the auction, to which Hercules was invited. He



confirmed there was interest from football personalities, but none from the Royal Family.

The highest bids were mostly for the older limos, but the highest price was struck, with commission, for the Jaguar XJ220 1993 model which went for £234,750 (US\$330,763). Only 80 were ever produced of this model. The price estimate had been £130,000 to £160,000.

Elton's 1973 Rolls-Royce Phantom VI Limousine, the one with the 36-speaker stereo Hi-Fi, was the next highest, at £223,750. It's estimate was £110,000 to £150,000. The 1987 Bentley Turbo R Four Door Saloon, which carried Gianni Versace, but also Elton to Diana, Princess of Wales' funeral in 1997, went for £49,350, far exceeding the estimate of £18,000 to £25,000. At the news conference, Elton phoned from Atlanta to say he was thrilled with the result, and realised there was a "lot of money to be made in secondhand cars"!

A spokesperson for Christies said that Elton made the decision to sell the cars before his costly High Court hearing and that it was unconnected with his legal costs



FACE-TO-FACE TOUR CONTINUES

Elton and Billy continued their Face-to-Face tour with a Southern flavour in Atlanta on April 24. As Elton is a part time Atlanta resident - he spoke about several local things/places/friends, and how he usually comes back to Atlanta after most of his concerts in the eastern US. During Your Song, Elton used his best southern accent, changing the lyrics to say 'This One's for y'all', drawing a huge response from the crowd. The Face-to-Face tour is now finished for the time being, but we hope that more dates will be announced soon. In the meantime. Elton continues his Solo tour in Europe this summer (see page 27 for details).

VIENNA LIFE BALL

Elton declared Vienna's ninth annual Life Ball a success, after opening the event on June 18th. He made a speech at the gala, one of Europe's biggest Aids charity events, and accepted a cheque for £250,000 for his Aids foundation to support projects in Africa. He said: "We have to look reality in the eye. Aids affects not only the health of individuals, but also the economy, politics and society itself."

FAN TO MEET ELTON

One lucky concert goer at Elton's show in the Baltic state of Latvia will get to meet Elton just before the show - just for having the winning concert ticket. Elton is scheduled to arrive in Latvia by private plane from his mansion in Nice on July 21, two hours ahead of the concert in Skonto Stadium.

ELTON PERFORMED AT

PRIVATE PARTY

Elton played a private concert in Austin, Texas, on June 2 for Dell executive Mort Topfer and his wife on their anniversary. There were 140 guests for which Elton played a near 2 hour solo show. Everyone was stunned when the "very special guest performer" was announced to be Sir Elton John. Speculation in a local newspaper said that it cost the executive over US\$1.2 million.

SONGS FROM THE WEST COAST

Elton told a French newspaper that the new studio album, Songs from the West Coast, will be released in September 2001. Elton and Bernie have written and recorded 20+ songs in various sessions over the past six months. According to Elton himself, twelve songs will make it on the album which he described as "pop rock", and similar in style to Madman Across The Water. The release date has since been reported as October 2001.

COURT CASE APPEAL LATEST

Elton was refused permission to appeal a ruling against him in his recent multi-million pound battle over touring costs on June 6. A judge in the High Court in London rejected Elton's £14 million claim in April, landing Elton with an estimated £8 million legal bill. The same judge, Mr Justice Ferris, said he was not satisfied an appeal "would have any real prospect of success". Elton's legal team can still make a further application for permission to appeal directly to the Court of Appeal, but it is not vet clear whether Elton will pursue this. The application for permission to appeal related only to PricewaterhouseCoopers.

QUIZ SHOW EXIT

Elton pulled out of UK TVs screening of Have I Got News For You at the last minute - and was replaced by Hercules' lookalike: Ray Johnson, who was introduced as "Elton John". After round one, captions flashed up on the screen saying, "It's Not Really Elton John" and "Elton John was booked yesterday but he pulled out - bastard". Have I Got News For You spokeswoman said: "It was just a bit of fun."

According to reports, Elton pulled out of the show at the last minute because of exhaustion. His spokesman said: "Elton's been on the road constantly this year and has also been spending time in the studio. He gets tired just like everyone else." Elton has since spoken about plans to take part in the next series. "I really don't know what all the fuss was about and why people got so stroppy. I was ill at the very last minute so they couldn't get a replacement," he said, adding: "In any case, I'm going to do the show in September."

EL DORADO VIDEO

Elton and Tim Rice's animated movie The Road to El Dorado is available on video and DVD in UK shops, from the beginning of May.

CHARITY FASHION GALA

Elton joined old friend Donatella Versace, Mick Jagger and a host of supermodels at a charity fashion event on June 10. The Prince of Wales attended the gala evening at Waddesdon Manor in Buckinghamshire, England, in aid of the Macmillan Cancer Relief charity. Elton was booed by photographers as he entered the event, as he was running late and didn't have time to stop and pose for photos.

ELTON AT THE THEATRE

Elton was among guests at the opening of the Pet Shop Boys' new West End musical on May 30. Closer To Heaven is the first theatre attempt for the songwriters, who Elton counts among his good friends. The musical is a tale of sex, drugs and rock-and-roll in London clubland. Elton attended the performance at London's Art Theatre with David, and said afterwards: "I thought it was absolutely brilliant. I thought it was one of the most incredible nights I have had at the theatre for a long time. It has great music, a great story and great performances, I would give it 11 out of 10," he added.

DAVID IS "ONE TO KNOW"

David Furnish was voted amongst the best connected people in Britain, according to a survey in the June 2001 edition of society magazine Harpers and Queen. He came in at 10th place; however there was no mention of Flton!

NEW NIGEL OLSSON ALBUM

Nigel's latest project, Move the Universe, featuring the Japanese singer i, along with Kai Olsson and Kiki Dee, is due for release in Japan on July 4. You should be able to pre-order it at any of the following websites: www.CDJapan.co.jp, www.Gemm.com, or www.CDEurope.com. There is no release date scheduled for the rest of the world, but we hope to be able to bring you news of that soon. The album features an outtake from Elton's Made In England album called Building a Bird.

CHRISTMAS NUMBER ONE?

Elton is set to star in a Christmas Special of UK TVs children's programme Bob The Builder for BBC1, to be shown on Christmas Eve. 'Bob' will also record a version of Crocodile Rock with Elton in a bid to get this year's Christmas No 1. Bob. voiced by actor Neil Morrissey, will get together with EJ later this vear to record the 1972 hit. The Christmas Special TV programme will feature the Crocodile Rock track. Elton will also provide the voice for an animated Elton. The storyline is top secret but it is believed Bob is called on to help Elton win back his confidence. Neil told us: "We've just done a Christmas special show with Elton, Noddy Holder and Chris Evans, which is fantastic." Elton's spokesman confirmed he had been recording for the Christmas show in May.

NEW ELTON BOOK IN SEPTEMBER

His Song: The Musical Journey Of Elton John, by Hercules member Elizabeth J. Rosenthal, will be published by Billboard Books in September 2001. The book is being published in the United States. The book will also be distributed by Windsor Books in October 2001 in the UK and parts of Europe. As the first biography of Elton's entire career, His Song profiles all the albums and tours and explains Elton's artistic ups and downs.

YOUR SONG IN HIT FILM

Hit film Moulin Rouge features actor Ewan McGregor singing Your Song, in full. He was given the stamp of approval by Elton, Director Baz Luhrmann said: "Elton had to approve the song for Ewan. He said, 'Oh, my God, he's a real singer!"

ONE NIGHT ONLY

ON VIDEO

Footage from "One Night Only" is now available on video in the US. The tape features Elton's performance of greatest hits, recorded at New York's Madison Square Garden on October 20 and 21, 2000.

NEW VENICE APARTMENT

UK newspaper The Mirror disclosed in May that Elton and David have bought a grand apartment overlooking the Grand Canal in Venice. We understand that Elton gave the go-ahead for the purchase on the day he was told that he had lost his High Court claim for damages. David reportedly seemed grumpy when The Mirror called to congratulate him on his new home. "How did you know about this? It's supposed to be secret. It's not even been bought in Elton's name." So was it bought in the name of David Furnish? "I'm not saving."

RENATE IN THE PRESS

The British Press Complaints Commission upheld a complaint against the Sunday Mirror newspaper on April 24, for publishing the address of Elton's ex-wife, Renate. But the PCC rejected complaints from Renate that the article, headlined "Sad, lonely life of the woman who loved and lost Elton John", represented an invasion of her privacy, harassment and misrepresentation. The article, published in June 2000, was accompanied by photos of Ms Blauel in a gas petrol station forecourt. FOOTBALL NEWS

Elton spoke of his delight at bringing Gianluca Vialli in as the new manager at Watford Football Club, after the retirement of Graham Taylor. Speaking in May, Elton said "I am incredibly excited that we have appointed Luca and his team," said Elton. "But following Graham Taylor is difficult as Graham is a legend."

HEIRS AND GRACES

Elton is a fan of Mayor of Plattsburgh, New York State, Daniel Stewart, reported the Plattsburgh Press-Republican newspaper on May 7. Just ahead of his concert with Billy in Montreal, Canada, Elton surprised Stewart and a friend by offering them free, front-row tickets to the show. "This guy came directly up to us and gave us these passes and said, 'Mayor Stewart, this is compliments from Elton,'" said Stewart, who is the first openly gay mayor elected in New York state.

JOHN JORGENSON RETURNS

John Jorgenson filled in for Davey Johnstone as Davey flew back home on May 7 after the shocking news about his son. According to fans that have been to the second Chicago show, John performed very well as Davey sound&act-alike. The show started with Elton singing Happy Birthday to Billy who turned 52 that day.

ELTON ON US TV

On July 4, 2001, U.S. television TNT will broadcast an all-star tribute to Brian Wilson, featuring Elton, David Crosby, Vince Gill, Billy Joel, Ricky Martin, Carly Simon, Paul Simon, Matthew Sweet and many others, according to official reports.

AUCTION LET-DOWN

A jumpsuit owned by Elton failed to sell at all in an Internet auction held on April 21, 2001. The rhinestone jumpsuit didn't meet its \$10,000 reserve price.

UKTV APPEARANCE

Elton was the main guest on chat show So Graham Norton, Channel 4 on March 7th. On a notoriously risqué show, Graham and Elton didn't let us down, with many saucy personal stories, and a gift for Elton of a football complete with a man's genitals!

FIGHT WITH A PHOTOGRAPHER?

It has been reported that Elton was involved in a bust-up with a cameraman outside trendy London restaurant, The Ivy, in March. Elton was said to be furious at having his picture taken and began hurling abuse at the photographer, while his partner David split the two up and got Elton safely into the restaurant. Elton was also attending the nearby Ritz Hotel for a party he hosted to celebrate his birthday. An onlooker said: "Elton got out of the car and then just went mad. He was annoyed at having his picture taken and hurled abuse at the snapper." Tempers hadn't cooled when Elton left the restaurant - the pair exchanged words again.

SATURDAY NIGHT WAS ALRIGHT

Rising star Anastacia played to a sell-out crowd in London on 9 June. During the encore she spoke of the highlight of her career so far; dueting with Elton at Madison Square garden last October. "I can't remember being on stage but the man kissed my navel!" Fulfilling the hopes of two Hercules members in the audience she went on to perform Saturday Night's Alright For Fighting.

'he announcement of 3 shows at the Allstate Arena in Rosemont, Illinois, did NOT thrill me, due to the exorbiant \$175 regular ticket price. \$525+ to attend 3 concerts? At that rate it is almost cheaper to fly to Hawaii or Europe and see a few Elonly shows! So. I initially planned on seeing only 1 or 2 of these shows near my home.

Due to some

fortunate twists of fate. I ended up seeing all 3 without busting my budget. Though the set lists and antics did not vary much, I realized early into the first show that I had to go to the second show. Why? First, because I had to hear EJ's version of "Just The Way You Are" again, since it was much better than Billy's. (No apologies.) Also, because of the excellent rendition of "All the Girls Love Alice"; the EJ band really rocked. I missed John Jorgénson's guitar on this, but Bob Birch's bass stood out for a change.

Since the tour opening on the West Coast, several songs had been dropped from the set: about 2 each of Elton's, Billy's, and from their joint end-of-show jam. The Chicago shows were very nearly 3.5 hours long even with 6



missing songs.

Near the end of the first (Monday night) show, Elton made a startling announcement that would totally change the mood, and the rest of the tour. Before "Candle...", he told the crowd that the son of guitarist Davey Johnstone (Oliver, age 9) had just died in an accident that night. Fans were stunned. The next day we found out that the boy had drowned in a swimming pool at home in California.

I speculated that John Jorgenson might be called upon to fill Davey's place for the rest of the shows. That turned out to be the case, and it was great to see JJ on stage again, but very sad that it was due to a terrible tragedy. John told me that he promised Davey, "he would ROCK and have fun for him," even under the

was different during the guitar solos---but in a good way, sounding energetic and fresh. EJ appeared to be "wowed" a few times, and JJ gradually got more comfortable wandering over to the EJ side of the stage more

often. If Davey and John will be playing together again, perhaps they should sometimes take turns on stage so as not to cover up/drown out the other's playing.

Friday's show was a celebratory capstone to the week, the music triumphant over adversity. Elton dedicated it to the Johnstone family, and I could feel that the whole band played their hearts out in tribute.

Musically, Billy injected some surprise instrumental tunes just before the final song: he started with Gershwin's "I've Got Rhythm", Elton accompanying. Together, both followed with short pieces of "The Sound of Music", and 3 or 4 other songs from the classic film, for a crowd sing-along, before finally segueing into the last "Piano Man." What a week......!

AN EMOTIONAL CONCERT – JOHN JORGENSON

George Matlock reviews John's The Borderline gig on Nov. 20, 2000. Adapted from a report on www.eltonfan.net

Before the show, there were antics outside the doors which remained firmly shut until gone 8pm. JJ stepped outside to conduct an interview on a mobile phone. We wondered what sort of interview it was, as we watched JJ walk over to a garbage skip and rummage in the pile. Several black polythene bags later, JJ walked back with a cream-coloured flex cable from an old electrical kettle, and remarked: "That will come in handy. Just needs a clean."

The Hercules crowd thought the interview was conducted with one Benjamin Pell, John Reid's bin raker!

But John's comment is typical of this down-to-earth, warm and personable performer.

JJ was pleased to see the Hercules fans, as was his drummer, former Elton band member Charlie Morgan, who came over from the US to support JJ's first ever UK tour. He was also joined on stage by Badfinger's Jeff Ross on keyboards and guitar, and a Glaswegian bass guitarist, Alan Thompson - tipped to play in a revival of Deacon Blue.

JJ performed songs from his

new album Emotional Savant, such as Jig in 'D', which JJ insisted he does play in 'D', as well as tracks from The Beatles, in his 1 hour-50-minute show.

JJ remarked after several songs, that he usually has an assistant that passes him new guitars on stage. "But this isn't an Elton John concert and so we don't have the budget. And that doesn't include any missing millions!"

JJ also referred to a music festival in France which he's visited four times, on an idyllic island on the River Seine at a town called Samois. He was so inspired by the friendly locals, he wrote a song about them, a Waltz, played in the traditional rhythm by Charlie. The song was called Valse de Samois.

Among guest appearances were producer Gus Dudgeon and Elton duet singer, the wonderfully at-ease Kiki Dee, mingling with the crowd and dancing to JJ's performance.

Several more The Beatles songs followed, as JJ, who spoke of the fun playing Liverpool's Cavern Club last week on tour, sounded as though he'd never left the Cavern. Now he's back!

SNAP BIOG:

Southern California native and a three-time winner of the Academy of Country Music award for "Guitarist of the Year," John Jorgenson was classically trained as a child - his father conducted for Benny Goodman. John, who idolised Goodman, even played with his hero. Later, John went on to work for eight years as a member of the Jazz and Bluegrass group at Disneyland. While employed at the "happiest place on earth," John contributed his skills on a number of instruments including mandolin, saxophone, guitar and clarinet. At another point in his career he was the featured bassoonist for the L.A. Camerata. Yet it was

John's guitar skills that brought him fame and respect as he recorded with the Byrds, as well as Rose Maddox, Roy Orbison, Bob Dylan, Bonnie Raitt, Dan Fogelberg, and Michael Nesmith.

In 1986, John collaborated with West Coast cream, forming a truly traditional country-rock outfit called the Desert Rose Band. With the release of their second project in 1988, Running, they were named the Academy of Country Music's "Touring Band of the Year." This honour was repeated in 1989 and 1990.

Despite major success, by 1992 the band was fragmenting. John joined the Hellecasters, a band that came together after a one-time-only gig in 1991. Comprised of John and fellow Hellecasters Will Ray and Jerry Donahue, the Hellecasters were made up of three lead players and no vocalist. The Return of the Hellecasters, their debut recording, was voted both "Album of the Year and "Country Album of the Year" in 1993 by Guitar Player magazine. A second Hellecaster's project in 1995, Escape from Hollywood, followed. John recorded and toured with Elton John during 1995, staying with the band until late 2000. His debut solo album Emotional Savant came in 1999, and became available on Assassination Records in Europe in 2000.

Roger Pope hammers home to George Matlock about his early years in Elton's music. The full interview to be published in Hercules fanzine and online www.eltonfan.net later in 2001.

SNAP BIOG: Born Whitstable, Kent. 20 March 1947, his father a drummer, and mother a singer. He left school at 15 years, and took to a drum his father bought for £25. Within 3 months was playing in local band The Soul Agents, and within a year went professional. Touring the UK, band met Rod Stewart who was with Long John Baldry's Hoochie Coochie Men, and Rod joined. Roger has backed Buddy Guy, and was a member of the Kiki Dee Band. Roger also recorded for albums by Sir Cliff Richard, Hall & Oates, drums and bass for Al Stewart, was on LJB's It Ain't Easy (1971), Harry Nilsson's Nilsson Schmilsson (1971), and China self-titled album (1977). Roger's work for Elton albums: Empty Sky, Madman Across The Water, Tumbleweed Connection, Madman Across the Water, Rock of the Westies, and Blue Moves. His Hookfoot releases were: Hookfoot (1971), Good Times a Comin' (1972), Communications (1973), Roaring (1974), and Headlines (1975). This year, some of Chris Darrow's work were rereleased, 1971 debut album Chris Darrow back to back with Under My Own Disguise, with Roger on

drums and tambourine.

PARTY'S NOT OVER

It's March 10, 2001, and after several false starts, we manage to catch busy rock and roll's Roger Pope for an interview from a region he's never left since he was nine years old, the south coast of England.

Some people have misspelled his name as "Rodger", but we wonder why this drummer-with-attitude has also become labelled "rogue-er". When you chat with Roger, you realise this man who lived fast in the music years is now getting a grip on his life again. He's no rogue! He's just a solid character in a rock music industry dominated by PC-types, policed by the marketing Men In Black from the record companies.

He's even been the subject of some light-hearted ridicule. The late Jim Henson's The Muppet Show drummer was reputedly inspired by a combination of drummers Keith Moon, Ginger

Baker, and Roger!

But his real past, one of great drumming, is again being recognised in high places. After years of absence, Roger is now talking to Elton again. In June 2000, Roger was able to meet Elton backstage in Broadlands, again on his beloved south coast turf. And in October 2000, Roger and his supportive partner, Sue, flew over to see Elton perform the Greatest Hits Live at Madison Square Garden, New York.

They say everyone is the author of their own fate. But colourful Roger's only syntax error came when he spoke his mind, and ruffled a few feathers. And that's exactly what the fans would expect of a rock star! Geez! He's had some great stories in his Elton time, which he wants to share with the Hercules members. So make your excuses and pull over to chat with him today!

The song now making a comeback, Tiny Dancer, reincarnated for the soundtrack to new film Almost Famous, was

actually recorded in, well, let Roger tell is as it was...

["]I was in Hookfoot, a band created for the very first Elton album, Empty Sky. We had to pay our mortgages, mine was £22 a month, and we got £5 a day working on a main drainage system in Andover (south coast) as they were building a new housing estate, making the town an overspill for London. We're down the sewers, and I ask the gaffer whether we can get off early to go get an album recorded in London's Air Studios for Elton John [!]. This was for Madman Across the Water. We actually did four songs that night. I was also working this bloody big Hopper [a cement mixer]. I was covered in Cement."

GM: What was that? Semen? RP: "Ha! Cement dust! So, we start recording in the studio, and the cement was still in my hair. As I sweat, so this stuff is getting harder! I even still had my work clothes on. No time to get changed! Dave Glover was with me on the working site, and he was the bassist!"

Elton and John Reid were in the studio, but nobody noticed. Roger got £36 for that night's recording. He admits he cannot believe he passed up on taking a royalty, given that Tumbleweed Connection, had been a hit. Roger took a fee instead.

RP: "Elton was a friend. I wasn't doing it for the money. I'd even have done it for free. And yet I am a risk-taker who could see the album might do very well!"

Roger wanted to preserve Hookfoot, which also included Glover, lan Duck, Freddy Gandy, and Caleb Quaye. "It was probably one of the best bands ever", says Roger with passion. "But Dick James didn't really back us." The only album on CD, available from Germany, is Hookfoot Live in Memphis. "It's a radio show we did in 1973, and the audience were kept subdued.

I hardly noticed they were even there!" Roger firmly recommends this CD.

At MSG last year, Roger says he walked out half way through the first night's show. "I could see Elton's face, I know them eveballs, and I knew he was about to quit!" And Roger should indeed know...at the very same venue in 1977, on the penultimate night at the illustrious venue, former Elton manager John Reid, told the band five minutes before they were going on stage, that the band was being disbanded and Elton retiring. The next night was the last time Roger worked with Elton and a chapter in the Circle of Life closed.

Now it is reopened, thanks to Sue's decision to get in touch with Elton's new manager. Roger has never stopped loving Elton, whom he calls "a generous bugger", and Roger has not lost the attitude: "I saw that So Graham Norton show last night. He was disrespectful towards 'Elsie' and I know Elton. He should have punched Norton!" That's the knock-out sound advice of a man who beats things for a living! "I think Norton should be run over!" Take a bow Roger, and welcome home.



STAR! KIKREE

Kiki Dee chats to George Matlock.

Amoureuse to some of us, is still Loving & Free, as her classic self-written track from 1973 rings in our ears. She conveys instant warmth that has never faded, despite the roller-coaster ride of contemporary music.

iki Dee,

She has managed to fend off the vices that caught out others, such as the three "ds"drugs, depression, and drink problems, and her 1981 hit Star says it all: "Don't you tell me it's tough...They can build you up, and they can break you down, with just the right words".

In this interview, Kiki tells it all. She has views on the get-richquick phenomenon, underlined by the "Popstars" hype, and even re-assessed the song Star while we were chatting. That's how Kiki is: no fixed, stubborn views. Always prepared to think it over again. So what was it about Star? She admitted it was not one of her favourites. She's happier with the acoustic guitar in hand, and the gentle ballads. She's especially proud of her first ever attempt at song-writing with Loving & Free.

Star was more commercialised. But I suggested the song was a decoy. Much like Terry Jacks' 1974 classic Seasons In the Sun, so too with Star. It is an up-tempo feel-good rhythm which conceals bitter or forlorn lyrics.

Her latest album, recorded at the Tickety-boo offices in 1998, is Where Rivers Meet. It's an interesting blend of Asian culture music, and underlines a complete revisionism in Kiki's work. That change and lust for experimentation is thanks to the new music influence in her life, Carmelo Luggeri. Recently, he has opened a studio in Hertfordshire, north of London, where demos have already been recorded.

Kiki would sure like to record again with Elton, what with a number one UK hit in 1976 Don't Go Breaking My Heart, and follow-ups Loving You is Sweeter Than Ever (1979), and True Love (1993). Most recently, she partnered again, at MSG last October. But Kiki doesn't want to be labelled as "Elton's singer"; she wants to be defined as an individual. "Me and Elton are musically a million miles apart with my current direction," Kiki says.

Kiki, real name Pauline Matthews, has a nickname Elton gave her.
"He calls me
Stan, after the
footballer Stanley
Matthews," she says. "Also,
I'm sometimes known as
Perilous
Pauline, by
mostly just
Keek."

Getting
her name right
is really
important
since she
became
a radio presenter. It
was a nerve-wracking
experience, when she
narrated the 3-part The
Elton John Story on BBC Radio 2,
in November 2000. In her own
words:

"It was quite challenging. First of all, I was interviewed for it as a contributor. I heard they had thought about Phil Collins doing it, and I thought it was an odd choice. Then they asked whether I would present it! I had a script written for me. I remember having to lie down at home after doing it! I tried to narrate it in a natural way, but without punctuating it with too much of my own personality, especially













since it wasn't my words. I kept it deadpan really! It was fun."

There were a few aspects
Elton might not have appreciated
in this rockumentary: "There
wasn't time for me to sit and
analyse it, I was reading it off
the cuff, and didn't

contribute
towards it. The
moment when John
Reid was applauded
for steering
something, and the
drugs thing. I feel
people do dramatise that
part of his life, which is
understandable in

journalism."

GM: Elton does seem to encourage that too, talking a lot about the drugs situation. It came through in the recent Parkinson interview, as elsewhere.

KD: "Yes I guess he does. But the Parkinson interview was very good, Elton came across very grown up."

And which Elton songs does
Kiki like? "I like Rocket
Man, and ballads like
Come Down In Time from
that period. Daniel, because I
have a friend called Daniel in
New York, and I'm Still Standing.
I like the ballads most.

Nigel Olsson asked Kiki to

perform the Roachford song Naked Without You, for his new album, out in Japan since February. Nigel approached Kiki during the MSG show last October, Much like with Don't Go Breaking, this song was also recorded by adding Kiki's vocals on the other side of the world. Nigel in California, Kiki in London. The song was recorded in England in November, and Carmelo produced the vocals. "I haven't heard it yet, ha!" Kiki said it's close to the original version of the song, but as a duet. "I liked the lyrics, and I think my voice sounded good on it."

Kiki, born Bradford, Yorkshire, 6 March 1947, knew she wanted to sing since she was 10. The rest, as they say,

Stewart A.Brown & Mick Inkpen recite the Genesis to George Matlock

Mick Inkpen, the drummer we heard at the Cavern, never much cared for a "daft" name like Bluesology, culled from a famous 1960s song by jazz man Django Reinhardt. But how wrong he was. Not only was it Elton's first proper band, and one which catapulted him into worldwide fame, the name lives on!

It lives on, bizarrely enough, in two acts which liked the name enough, to "nick it" themselves. Firstly, there is Armand & Bluesology, and another act, a black soul jazz crooner who goes under a name I kind of like, for reasons to become obvious during this special afternoon: King George Bluesology!

And in March, it lived on at the Cavern, as Mick and original vocalist and guitarist Stewart A Brown, together with his cousin Mick Noller on bass, re-create the sound of Come Back Baby. They were short of a keyboardist, but the name I'd recommend couldn't make it!

Stewart was all nostalgic when I called him in March on a Spanish island resort he has called home since 1976. Stewart is a crusader against the local techno muzak, and plays in a band called Me And Him, doing cover versions of songs like Daniel. "But we do them close to the original, to please the English tourists and expats. Sadly not re-interpretations," he says.

Music came early. "When I was eight, I visited three cousins of mine in Ipswich, and two of whom play. I picked up their guitar, and couldn't put it down! Someone took a photograph of me in short pants (never found it again!), and soon I acquired my own guitar." Stewart says.

Stewart was dating Reg's cousin. "I talked to her fanatically about music, and said I needed a piano player for this Blues stuff we play. She invited him. Reg came around, and played Great Balls of Fire, my goodness, exactly like Jerry Lee Lewis!"

Stewart says Elton adapted fast to Blues, the genre of the band. Both Stewart and Mick were big jazz blues fans, perhaps because it was exotic to someone living in a comfortable London suburb instead of an impoverished outback of 1930s America.

"We are really looking orward to playing at the Cavern, and you will recognise something about Blues in the lyrics of a song we hope to perform." says Stewart.

But Stewart admits they had to find a commercial song to record. That spawned Reggie's first song, lyrics AND music, Come Back Baby. "It was his song, and his style completely, even though we didn't know what his style was back then," Stewart says. "Reg wasn't a prolific writer at that time."

Bluesology also had their scrape with the Underworld! The band's fast-talking manager Arnold Tendler convinced label Fontana to record the mono song. But he later fell from grace, a man involved with the jewellery trade who had some bad luck and went to prison for a time in the early 1970s. "But he was a sweet rough diamond! I really nice, sweet man," Stewart recalls.

Dave Murphy was another bad luck story, as Bluesology cranked up the legal points! The saxophonist fell out with the band, and took the tour van from London to Germany and was never seen again! "I gave him the sack at Clook Clique, the railway hotel in West Hampstead, and the van vanished forever! Fortunately, no instruments inside!" After that, sax was covered by Elton Dean, the half-name inspiration for Elton John.

With singers Alan Walker, Marsha Hunt and LJB, Stewart had already relinquished the lead vocals slot. But the hits came through, in November 1967 with UK chart-topper Let

baby the Heartaches Begin.

and later a solo debut beckoned for Stewart on Elton/Bernie-penned I Can't Go On Living Without You, arranged by Bluesology's replacement for Reggie, Jimi Horowitz. And a song Lulu didn't end up singing in the 1969 Eurovision Song Contest. Side B of the song was Don't Call Me, by Stewart and later Elton lyricist, Gary Osborne

Mick recalls the name Bluesology could be traced back to Reggie's bedroom record collection. "It was huge, about 800 LPs back then. Carefully catalogued. He had the Diango album in his collection." He also had a book club collection, and no jokes please, "a Dickens collection at his fingertips.

Mick remembers not being a star on guitar, when guitar bands were all the rage. Drummers were less common. He'd already formed a lacklustre band, and heard Stewart's The Corvettes were splitting. Mick sensed his moment, and, with bass guitarist Rex Bishop, joined Stewart and Reg. Salesman Mick: "If I came with a bass player, it's a better ready-made package."

Bluesology 'toured' the UK. At one Scottish venue they wouldn't let punters have beer glasses for fear of trouble. Mick wonders whether that was the inspiration for the Scot on picture sleeve to Elton's Saturday Night's Alright (for Fightin').

But Elton knew how to quell a riot, even then. "We were the inappropriate entertainment at an Irish wedding in Neasden, London, when a fight broke out. Reg pulled out all his sheet music, and we dropped blues numbers, switching to pub standards. Soon they ran out of furniture," said Mick.

ne Bv 1967, Mick was getting tired of the routine, and he got a further discouragement when Bluesology was asked to back Patti Labelle. Patti thought Mick couldn't manage a technique. Stewart says he's heard Mick has now perfected it!

SNAP BIOGS:

Stewart: Born 6 Feb. 1948, Hillingdon, London. Reg joined Stewart's band The Corvettes early 1960s, then Mick Inkpen as they rename Bluesology, with Twink's Fairies' Freddy Gandy later replacing Rex Bishop. In 1969 works with Nigel Olsson on Plastic Penny's last German tour. Joins Cochise with BJ Cole, a steel guitar player, for one year. Retires to travel, farm, and start a family in Wales 1972.

Mick: Born 26 January 1948, Pinner. Now lives in Devon. worked with local bands and gave up drums in 1984.



SCHOOL REPORT 2:

Teacher I need you!!

Following the popularity of our first School Report on March 2001 fanzine, George Matlock talks to Elton fan Judy Williams who recalls Pinner County Grammar School

George Matlock: If Elton remembers you, what was your maiden name?

Judy Williams: It was Williams. I married, changed my name, then divorced, married a second time, reverting to my maiden name.

GM: How did you come to know Reginald, as Elton was then known?

JW: He was a year above me in school. I started at Pinner County in 1959. So I didn't know him an awful lot. I knew him probably more than he knew me. We weren't in classes together. It was through Dick Morgan's connection at the Royal Academy of Music that I really got to know more of Elton. That was at my third or fourth year at Pinner.

GM: Was there anything about Reg that made people take notice of him?

JW: He was not a bully. He was a pleasant person. Often those in years above you at school throw their weight around, and are intimidating. He never did.

GM: Some people are just conventional, they are just another brick in the wall, to use Pink Floyd's famous school rebel lyric. How would you describe him?

JW: He stood out insofar as he dressed a little bit differently. But one thing that's interesting: I've looked back through all my old school magazines, and he's not mentioned even once in those. That's brick in the wall. That surprises me, because when you think of his achievements at the Royal Academy – he was probably

the only person at the school who did that. It didn't get mentioned at all. I don't know why. Maybe he didn't want it mentioned. He never made a big thing about it. He was known for being good musically. He didn't strut his stuff. He didn't play sport. He didn't stand out in any other way.

GM: Perhaps he wasn't an exhibitionist, and his modesty is what cost him his peer group value. But dressing differently is often a sign of 'look at me'. In what way was it?

JW: You could always do subtle things with the regulatory school uniforms we all had to wear. Things like the collars of his shirt were different. He had a tie-pin in his collar. Waist-coats were a fashion. And I have a memory of him doing that. He wasn't tall, and he was podgy. But he just looked smart.

GM: How was he academically? You see him in television interviews and he comes over very articulate, quick-witted, and even interested in the affairs of state. I think he stood for the Conservatives in student elections, didn't he?

IW: I don't remember too well.

GM: In that case he didn't win.

JW: No, and I didn't vote for him, ha! It rings a few bells. I don't think anyone of us was particularly politically aware, being young. I was a CND supporter [Campaign for Nuclear Disarmament]. What I do remember was his musical ability being respected by the music and head masters of the school.

GM: What was the music master's name?

JW: Mr Stoupe. The headmaster, Mr Westgate-Smith, was also very interested in music. He was a

lovely man. He held Reg in high regards, although Reg was never written up, nor big in assembly [religious service].

GM: We know now that Elton protects his privacy. He came from a middle class family, and perhaps didn't feel the need to prove himself as much?

JW: I think you're very right. I don't think he even had a nickname at school.

GM: Did other pupils bully him?

JW: Never saw him threatened. I think his musical abilities were enough to hold off trouble. It wasn't an unpleasant school, but anyone who wasn't good at sport got bullied. The fact that the headmaster respected him also helped.

GM: Tell us about the 11-plus Grammar school. So you were bright young things?

JW: Ha! When you got to Grammar school, it was only the top form in the school that actually got any attention. So that once you got to Grammar school, having

been streamed, you were streamlined again! Anyone who was not in the top form was not valued as much, which I think was very sad. There was an elite of the elite. Those creamed off would go to university. I was initially in the top forms, and I think he was in the mid-streams.

GM: So, academically he didn't excel.

JW No he didn't. I don't know what his final 'O' Level results were, but doubtless passes.

> GM: Did you sense at time that he was interested in university? He didn't go on to do 'A' Levels to qualify for university.

JW: No, at the time he was leaving the school in 1964 I went out once with a member of Bluesology, who I think was called John, and I remember we went to a party where Reg was there. He was earning his living through playing music. I found that odd: my career looked as though it would be university, which was the traditional route. He was unusual in that he left school, went to

work, but not in a bank or anything like that.

GM: Dick Morgan said he had few recollections of Elton being in the company of girls.

JW: No, I don't have such recollections either. I remember a group of men whom I loosely would call "dandy" when Elton was in his fifth or final year at school. They prided themselves on the way they looked, but not in an ostentatious way. And I remember Elton being part of that group. They were refined rather than rugby players, and rather than academic. I never remember him having a girlfriend.

GM: In those days, the morning religious service was a big thing in Christian schools. Was there evidence of him excelling there?

JW: Well, he was the only pupil allowed to play the school piano. It was a Steinway. Only teachers played it. Very select. But I don't have recollections of him even playing in assembly. The only thing he might remember me in, was a

school play, when he was in the Lower Sixth year. He came in during rehearsals and played the piano. The production was Bertolt Brecht's The Caucasian Chalk Circle. He was just around, not even particularly involved in the production. I have this memory of him coming in and just playing wow! Key-perfect just from cold.

GM: Did he have regular friends?

JW: I looked at the school photo. There was a guy called Martin, who is standing next to him in the photo. I can't think of anyone who was a real buddy. He was a loner.

GM: I bet some pupils wished they'd got to know him better! Did you try to get to know him?

JW: He was older than me. There was also hope the boy would make the first move!

GM: That would be interesting wouldn't it? Might have changed his life forever, and I don't think anyone would have thanked you for it, ha!

JW: I liked him, perhaps because he was different.

GM: The school romance – the one that got away.

JW: Oh God!

GM: So how much of a fan are vou?

JW: I have many of his records, although I think I would like him whether I knew him or not. The songs touch different parts of your life at different times. I went with Dick to see Elton at Margham Park in Wales [2000]. I live at the end of the world, so it's not easy to go to shows. I grew up next door to Dick in Pinner, and we both had parents with connections with Pembrokeshire, Wales. I moved here 20 years ago. I'm currently playing his One Night Only and enjoying it.

Interview conducted February 25, 2001. Now virtually extinct in the UK, Grammar schools were state-run schools where academically-gifted children went on sitting the 11-plus exam, aged 11 years. Vocationally-skilled kids went to Secondary Modern Schools, in the days before Comprehensive education was introduced in the late 1960s.

PART 4 OF OUR EXCLUSIVE INTERVIEW WITH ELTON SOUND ENGINEER CLIVE FRANKS



Clive gave our UK manager George Matlock a full 2 _-hour interview on 12 July 2000:

> George Matlock: The venues have tested you a bit haven't they? Tell us about Wembley Stadium June 1998, when Billy Joel famously had to pull out.

Clive Franks: That was the worst show I have ever had to deal with in my life. I knew that (sound problem) was going to happen, and I told them before that. But they wanted to play across the stadium for a more intimate feel than having the band at one end of the stadium and crowds far out. They thought there would be more people closer to the stage. Normally, bands play lengthways, as we've done many times before. The new format was done just before us by The Eagles at Wembley. They had countless problems too! So I don't know why we didn't learn from that. And there's also the over-hanging metal roof. The sound gets trapped under there, bounces out, at about a half-second decay time, and is louder than the damn PA! So you hear two of everything, the second sound being louder and tinny and horrible. (I have delusions) of a line of people who came up to me, and my staff had to fight them off! It became very fish-eye lens to me! I saw Klu Klux Klan people, and people in black hoods with scythes and hatchets, screaming at me to do something about the sound. There was nothing I could do.

GM: The only other venue I can describe on a tinny dustbin

In the concluding part of our exclusive interview Clive Franks recalls concert venues to George Matlock, and the times he nearly quit Elton John

Richter scale is Wembley Arena, especially in December 1997 with the band.

CF: It's another tough room because, not a lot of people know, it's built with a swimming pool underneath the floor. It's hollow down there. And the sound just gets trapped in a huge hole. A nightmare. For a solo show I could get away with it, but for a band, impossible. But it was ten-times better than the Wembley Stadium! When you play a small club, the sound is pretty much uniform. But when you play such a vast area, different parts of the arena sound different. You can't get it perfect everywhere.

Clive seems to agree with Hong Kong on how to improve personal sound, with his right Red revolutionary idea.

CF: I've been saying it for years. Not have a PA system at all, but give everyone wireless headphones. Everyone would get the same sound. Of course, it would cost you a fortune because you'd only get a quarter of the headphones back! That for me would be a wonderful solution, and then I would mix, wearing headphones. Maybe it would be weird though for people to really get into a rock concert with phones on.

GM: A bit like being at home in front of the Hi-fi! Wasn't headphones for the crowd demanded by the municipal authorities in Hong Kong for the aborted Elton handover concert, July 1997. The Asian press reported Elton angered by the proposal and he quit.

CF: I remember that. I heard that comment on the radio myself. It's amazing what you read on the internet. I don't know the facts, only that the show was off because of all the rules and it was too loud. I think it was one of the things which came into it.

GM: Perhaps Beijing isn't an Flton fan!

CF: I've played places like that before. In Australia, when we played with Billy Joel in 1998, in Sydney. We did three or four nights at the Cricket Ground, and we were following Michael Jackson who had been there a few weeks before. There had been massive complaints about his sound. Not that the sound was bad – as I know the guy who mixes Michael. But volume gets out. There's a lot of low sounds in Michael Jackson's show, synth bass stuff, and it's not top end which travels but the bass. I had the Sydney council sitting with décibél meters with me, and the level they wanted me to go at...I tell you, if I'd sneezed I'd have sent their meters over the top. Such a low decibel level, so frustrating. The mix was good, but the energy wasn't there because of the low permitted level. But you cannot go against the council because you are allowed x-minutes per hour exceeding the decibel limit which was about 94 DB at the console. When the audience applauded, it did go over 94! If you go over the number of minutes allowed, you get charged thousands of dollars per extra minute. So you try not to run up those costs.

> As we publish this instalment, Elton is currently trying to overturn a court ruling on overseas tour expenses at which ex-manager John Reid gave evidence, having settled with Elton out of court. In an amusing anecdote, Clive in July 2000 talked about how some costs were wilfully made in that era:

CF: I remember John Reid once came out to me and said 'why is the sound so soft?' And I said 'because I'm up against this DB limit and we're gonna get fined.' He said 'sod it! Turn it up.' This one show cost us US\$10,000! He

told me to turn it up! He felt it more important for people to have a good time.

Clive admits a solo tour eases his job to get a good sound, but with the band, he sometimes despairs.

CF: With the band it's more of a challenge. I get very critical and go through bouts on tours when I get very depressed because of the sound. But my acceptance threshold is very high. Many people come up to me and say it was the best sound they have heard in this building, which is all very well, but it doesn't always make me feel good. Nowadays we only do three or four shows a week, and so there's a lot of sitting around. So for those three hour performances I want the sound to be great.

GM: So, if you're a perfectionist, how close have you ever been to quitting?

CF: Once or twice. It's hard when you've got family. Sadly, my marriage fell apart, after 19 years. It's amazing how any relationship in this (showbusiness) can last, but we're still very close, and have two wonderful kids. Sometimes everything gets on top of you. Even Elton sometimes suffers this 'oh God, another gig tomorrow'. Yet, once you're on stage you do it! People don't see the other side. People think it's all rock and roll and parties. Well, when we were younger there were the parties. Now with family commitments it's harder...but it is like a drug. Many times I've said 'Never again!'. I get home, three or four weeks, and I want to go on the road again. It's strange, it has that power. I play several instruments, and always dreamt of being a rock star, and never made it. So I was very grateful when Elton asked me to work for him, where I could channel my musical energies. I suppose I álso am a performer

with my own audience! I am exhausted at the end of every show. Not because I'm getting older. I always was like that.

GM: Sounds like a Work-out.

CF: It really is! The only exercise I get, I'm a lazy bugger really, ha! Elton is a powerful character and when he's in the positive mode, which, thank God, nowadays is nearly all the time, then it's wonderful. He went through some bad times [drugs and drink] and it dragged down everyone else. It was hard to think positive. Now, Elton can walk in a room of people, and sway the mood in there. He's funny, quick-witted, but sometimes gets uncomfortable if he can't communicate with people on his level. As well as I think I know him, you might assume I can sit down with him for a chat, but I keep it more as a business relationship. We talk, but perhaps not as deeply as I might like to. I don't feel comfortable with a oneto-one chat. Weird, but you will find among many people who work for him, that we respect him so much, that aura, that it almost inhibits you from relaxing and being yourself.

GM: It seems like the big tours, big venues, means the first thing you want to do is hang up your duties and relax – which means getting away from the work and its environment.

CF: I am looking forward to having six weeks at home soon, but I know that after a few weeks I will miss this, and want to do more. A strange mix!

Clive mixes the music, not the business and social life. Keeping the space between him and Elton has probably contributed to Elton's and Clive's mutual respect.

CF: It's 95 percent a working relationship. We hardly socialise. I

did go to his South of France house the other day, but only to fix Bob Halley's computer, and then they asked me to stay for dinner. And on the way to the show in Hyde Park, London (July 9, 2001) I had to stop off at Elton's central London home. I'd never even been there. It was interesting to see 'vet another home'. Now that I live in New Zealand there's even less chance of mixing with Elton. I was invited to his 50th birthday party in London (April 1997). Had I been here I would of course have gone, but I didn't make the trek from NZ. It's a very good working relationship. I will be here as long as I can hear, and as long as he can pound the ivories and sing.

GM: Were you at the (Tiara Ball, Windsor) party last week (July 2000)?

CF: No, I wasn't invited but I'm glad I wasn't asked, as I would have felt embarrassed saying no. I don't feel comfortable in that situation. I love what I do, but I'm not overly comfortable with this industry. I like to be with more down to earth people. There are some at such events, but there's also a lot of bullshit. I cannot make small-talk. I don't have an ego at all. The only time I talk about myself is when people like you call me, which is hardly ever. I've done very few interviews. I prefer being a back-room boy.

> Clive's idea of socialising is meeting old friends. The following week he was off to Cornwall, south-west England, to meet up with Joe Partridge, guitarist in the Kiki Dee Band.

Clive doesn't belong to the has-beens. Hercules salutes his work and wishes him many more years with Elton! Great thanks to Clive for this interview, and for supplying some of the photos we have used to illustrate this 4-part epic.

Dieter and new band Made In England started their first UK Tour on May 3. We publish a two part interview with the Great Pretender.

George Matlock: Dieter, thanks for agreeing to do this interview. It's a German name isn't it? But has it got anything to do with Elton's former tour sponsor, Diet Coke?

Dieter Graham: Yes, although I don't speak the language, and the only thing Diet is short for is Dieter, rather like Pete is short for Peter!

GM: You were on UK TV contest Stars in their Eyes in 1991. How did that come about? And did you win that contest?

DG: It came about by accident really. I didn't apply, and I didn't impersonate "Elton" at that time. I didn't win either, but feel rather it launched me as an impersonator, and I feel that I'm still learning to master what I've set out to do since then.

GM: How long have you been doing the Elton look-a-like and sound-a-like act? And I never asked how old you are?

DG: Some 10 years now, although I've always been a singer in my own right. I'm (43)

GM: You also do a fine vocal on Billy Joel. I'd say it's uncanny. Some fans told me at Chatsworth House in June you should have been brought in to replace Billy taken ill at Wembley Stadium in 1998! Which came first? The Elton or Billy act?

DG: Strangely both, I've been singing now for some 30 years, and both Elton and Billy inspired me in the beginning, hence the vocal likeness to them, you know it's All About Soul!

GM: Which act is more popular?

DG: That's a ridiculous question!


GM: Who helped you decide to do Elton John as an act?

DG: It was probably my brother John, he always thought that I sounded like him (Elton).

GM: Are you actually a fan of Elton, or do you just admire him?

DG: If you mean do I have a shrine? No! And if you admire someone then you must be a fan.

GM: Do you have a large Elton John collection? And what's your prized item?

DG: Only a modest amount of CDs and perhaps the rare masters double CD I always felt that his B sides were as good as his A sides.

GM: What's your favourite Elton John song?

DG: I don't have a particular one, as I feel that any one particular song can mean different things to the individual at any one moment in time

GM: Do you have an Elton song which you don't like?

DG: L.S.D. (Lucy in the Sky with Diamonds).

GM: What other music do you like? And what other interests do you have?

DG: I like all kinds of music, from contemporary country through to trance. It's good not to be stale in musical tastes. Interests? Travel, sport, charities, living!

GM: Have you seen Elton solo recently?

DG: Unfortunately not, my role as impersonator takes up quite a bit of my time.

GM: Now, you have some exciting things going on with your act. No more of the funny (what I call spoof) things. You're now going ever-so-serious with the act and a new band. Tells us more about it.

DG: The show consists of a live band, Keys, drums, guitar, bass, and 4 girls, all singing dancing troupe with a 32-costume change, and it's bloody exciting for me!

GM: What's the band called? And will you take the band on tour across Europe?

DG: "MADE IN ENGLAND" is the name we've decided on, and hopefully next year (2001) will see us tour, we're in talks at this moment in time, and there are a lot of proposals being looked at!

GM: What's the background of the other band members? Are they really like Davey Johnstone, John Jorgenson, Nigel Olsson, and Dee Murray? Where did they come together from? And how much hard graft has it been to perfect their sound and act to appear like the Elton John Band?

DG: The band sound very authentic. But I wouldn't say they are all lookalikes! The band have had previous experience within the Theatre and corporate market with a female singer, who shall at this moment remain nameless (That should get you thinking, George).

GM: I have. I think she's a bloke in drag! You'll have to see the act to know the truth, however. Regrettably you don't play keyboards. That doesn't affect your act, which is strong on choreography and your singing talents. Do the band play their instruments?

DG: Indeed they do, but I do play the piano, but not on the gig. I still have another trick up my sleeve for you, but that I will save for a later date.

GM: Apart from entertainment, what other professions have you followed, since most "Stars in their Eyes" contestants have other lives too?

DG: I've worked down the mines, and for the odd TV company, and I've even been a chauffeur in the past, and occasionally used to drive James Mansion, the deposed president of the Seychelles around, but I've been a professional singer now for more than 20 years, and it's where my heart and soul are at!

GM: Apart from that TV series, what other shows or highlights have there been in your show career?

DG: Various network TV shows both here in England as well as New Zealand and Australia, plus a string of regional stations, an advert for BBC 1 advertising Radio 2. Also vocal credits to Untinished

Buisness (BBC drama), and of course Reeves and Mortimer show Shooting Stars live theatre tour for six weeks, where I opened the show every night. Yes I am mad!

GM: Well I didn't ask whether you're mad. But your CV reads true. New Zealand Hercules member Vicki Armstrong says she saw you down there some years ago! What does your family think of you doing these gigs?

DG: They are quite proud, but it's something I do for a living so when I'm at home I'm me, I don't have an identity crises, I know firmly who I am and what I want, and sometimes the stress of being away for long periods can be difficult for the family, as well as myself.

GM: Will you perform for Hercules at a special tribute act Contest in the USA next spring?

DG: I will always try to be there, as you well know, except with the band and one thing and another. It could prove tricky, but I will do whatever I can to be there, providing there is enough notice there shouldn't be a problem. But I can tell you I love doing your conventions, I get such a buzz, because the audience love it so much, it's great fun mate!!!

GEORGE MATLOCK CHATS TATS WITH EVILTWIN, ELTON'S ALTER EGO?

Summer is on its way, and there should be a lot more naked flesh about in the northern hemisphere. But some people will look decidedly "clothed" when they are not. That's the tattoo brigade. For all his extravagancies, Elton is not known to have ever burned his skin in the name of lasting art, but some of his fans sure have.

One American fan, who calls herself Eviltwin, has gone further. She has about half her body covered in the permanent images of Elton from different scenes and eras.

George Matlock: You call yourself Eviltwin on your website. What's the significance of that name?

Eviltwin: I am an identical twin, I am the evil one of us two, so I just kinda earned the name the honest way I suppose... now it has stuck, my tag on my car even says "eviltwin"!

GM: What's your real name? ET: My real name is Tonie Anthony Jeter. My twin sister's name is Tonia. No one actually calls me eviltwin in public or anything. Mostly it's just "twin or "sister" or "bitch"!! I am 26, and married.

What part of the world are you from?

I live in North Carolina. I am actually quite disappointed with Elton because he has not come to Charlotte in almost four years now. It's hard for me to see him otherwise!

Well, Tonie, you're definitely no Grey Seal, judging by the array of colourful tattoos on your body. How did you come by tattooing your body?

My twin sister got a tat above her knee of the raven (like E.A. Poe's) and so I thought hey!

that's pretty cool...So I thought hard and long and settled on the Captain Fantastic logo. While Luke (my tat artist) was doing it, we joked about doing a whole collage. Well anyone who has a tat can tell you how addictive they are. Nearly a year later, I had finally decided to go all out. Next I got the Harmony locket, then it just went downhill from there! I get them done a little at a time, \$50 here, \$25 there. Whatever I can afford and whatever Luke has time for.

Why did you choose Elton?

Because Elton is like a GOD! No seriously. I LOVE him! I wanted to get something that meant something special to me, And my other interests are serial killers and horror films. I thought that the Elton artwork might be more presentable in public!

What parts of your body are tattooed? And which tattoo is on which part?

The Elton tat is on my right leg just below my knee. It's about 6 inches tall and goes all the way around in a circle.

Dare I ask why you have selected the tattoos for their specific coverage on that part of your body?

I am fat, there is no other way around it. I decided if it was gonna be in an area that everyone would see it would have to be somewhere I was happy with. I wear shorts all the time so I don't mind people seeing my chubby legs!!

Do other parts of your body sport tattoos?

I also have the symbol from my favourite comic book character on my shoulder blade (Rorschach from The Watchmen) and "Thing One" from Dr. Suess on my upper arm. Except on its belly, instead of Thing One, it says: "Twin A" because I was first, my sister has "Twin B"!

Was it painful to put these tattoos on? And are they the real thing? Not washable?

Anyone who says that their tat did not hurt was either drunk or stoned! It hurt like heck, but Elton is a passion of mine so I just sang through the pain!! Luke lets me pop in an Elton CD (he is also a fan!) and we both sing away while he scrapes the ink onto my body! Nope, not washable temporary stuff here. This is gonna stay for life!

Is it possible to get these items in washable format? I'm sure many fans would snap them up!

I don't reckon they can. These are all Luke Edwards originals (aside from the album art that I specifically had him do, Blue Moves, and Captain Fantastic) the piece was done one tat at a time. We didn't plan it. It was made over a three year period and about 30 man hours was probably put into it. I can recollect how much money! (not enough I am sure, this thing is priceless!) Luke is amazing, he leads a band called Tater (www.tatertime.com) and runs a

(www.tatertime.com) and runs a bagel shop as well. He played Holiday Inn at my wedding reception! I cried!

Well Tonie, it's been a pleasure interviewing you.

Thanks for having me. Your readers are welcome to come and check out the tats.. it is actually quite behind, [she means backlog here!]. I have gotten more since then! I am getting Road to El Dorado done in a few weeks!
